

COUNTRY STORE



EDUCATION

MINERAL OF THE MONTH - GYPSUM (hardness 2)

Continuing down in hardness scale of rocks on the Moh Scale, our next step is a mineral about the hardness of Gypsum. Gypsum can be scratched with the fingernail. It is a very common sulfate mineral, which precipitates easily from solution, forming model—like crystals almost while you wait. Meter long crystals have been found in the Cave of the Swords in Mexico. If you are wondering what to bring to display this month, look for selenite or alabaster as they are kinds of gypsum.


Also bring your fire agate for display as our speaker this month will talk on fire agate. Bring both finished and rough material.

SAFETY: THE SAW

Let's make a safety check of the saw. This may sound like a maintenance check, but they are so related you can't do one without the other.

- Vise jaws must be in good condition to hold properly.
 Mine can be turned end-for-end.
 Any doubts and they should be replaced. This is easy enough since you have a good pattern.
- 2. Electrical cords must not be oil soaked or frayed. A quick visual check will usually spot potential problems. If your lights dim when you turn on a machine, turn off other machines on the same power source. If this doesn't help, try another outlet. You're not getting enough power.

 3. Take a look at drive belts and guards.. Do they need tightening or replacing?
- 4. When your slab saw cuts off, wait a few minutes. Let the mist settle, then open the hood. This is probably the most unsafe condition in sawing. In any case don't breathe the oil vapor.
- 5. Now take another look and ask yourself, "What has this guy overlooked? Did he mention to clean the sludge from the tank?" No wonder he saved this for last. This is often overlooked, but will extend the life of those expensive blades.

For a <u>Lubricant in Trim Saws</u>, use radiator anti-freeze as a cooling agent. It has no odor and will not rust your saw or evaporate.

HASSLE-FREE C B

I would like to give you some of what I know about CB communications. I have had a first class radio telephone license, and also taught electronics for several years at Santa Fe High School; so I should be qualified to write

NOC NEWS

The first thing is that there is nothing you can do to make your transmitter put out a stronger signal without also being illegal and have the Fed's hot on your tail. Don't fiddle with the transmitter. Let a competent technician do it for you. You can have your antenna adjusted for a low standing wave ratio. You will need a standing wave meter and probably would prefer it to be done by that competent technician.

Remember! You can't make your signal any stronger! You can make your receiver hear better. The squelch knob makes your receiver only able to receive strong signals. If you are trying to hear a weak signal, turn off your squelch!

* * * * * * * * * * * * * * *

Remember the squelch may get rid of that talkative bore but it will also stop the signal that you want to hear; so if you want to hear John Jones, or whoever, you need to have the squelch turned off. Remember, to hear a weak signal, turn off the squelch. Now if that signal you want to hear isn't loud, don't try to tell the other person to talk louder, just turn up your volume!

You may have a knob called RF gain or local and DX. DX is CB talk for long distance and that is what you want your receiver on when you are listening for that weak signal.

Now you have it in a nutshell. You can't make your signal stronger, only a technician can do that. can make your receiver better able to receive. Learn how to make your receiver do its very best.
