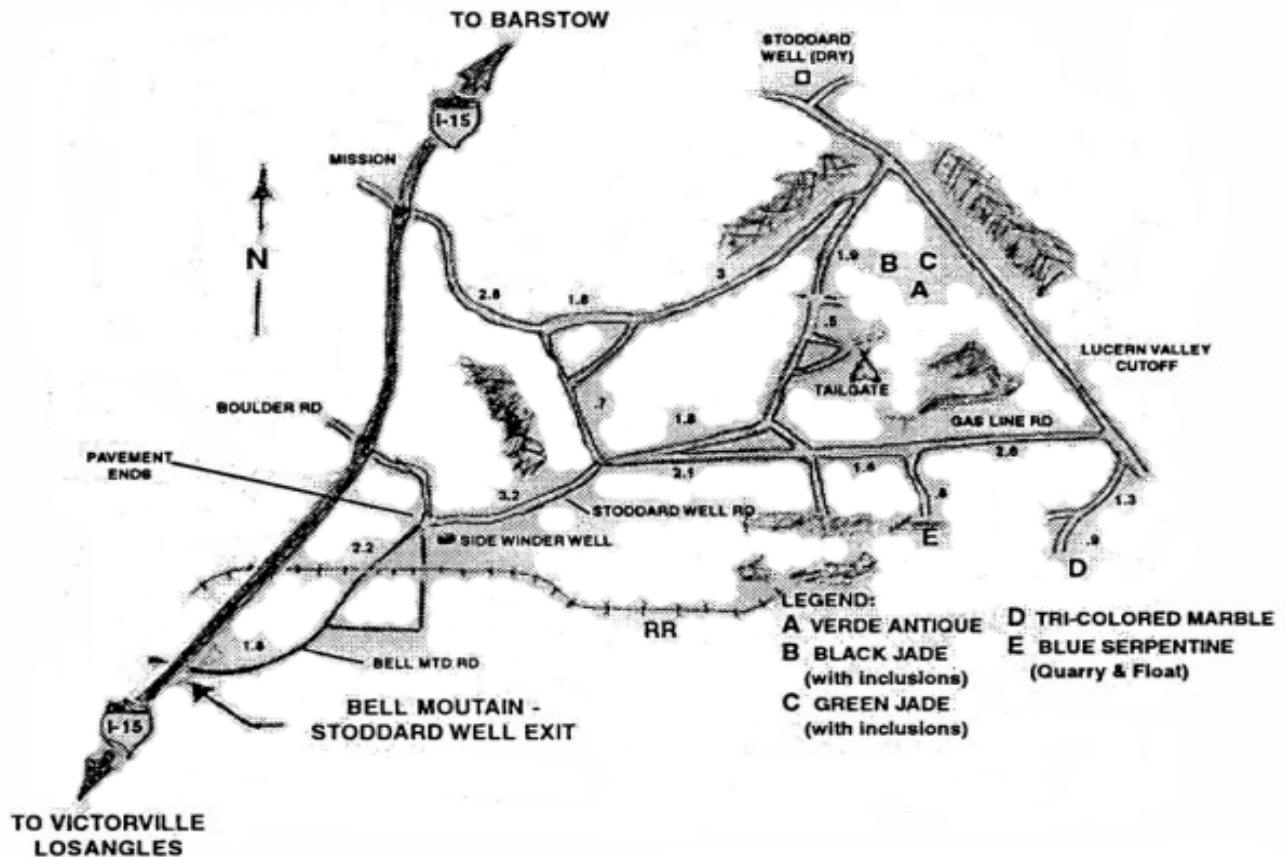

March 16 - 18 Field Trip

Our March field trip is to the 25th Annual Tailgate at Stoddard Well hosted by the Victor Valley Gem and Mineral Club. Collect Verde Antique - Tri-Colored Marble - Jade, and buy just about anything.

What is a tailgate? It all began about 21 years ago when the Victor Valley Gem and Mineral Club began hosting a free field trip and sale at Stoddard Well collecting area. The Tailgate is open to all clubs and rockhounds. Everyone is allowed to sell or buy just about anything. Most items for sale are related to gems, minerals, findings, and other related things, but you never know what you will see. The area is also noted for its abundance of rocks for collecting.

Camping: This is a dry camp area, so bring in your own water and other necessities. Supplies are available at the Bell Mountain service road. Roads are desert dirt and can handle motor homes with no problem.

Gem and Mineral Collecting: Verde Antique, and Green & Black Jade collecting areas are within walking distance from the Tailgate. The Verde Antique is in float and in a quarry. Jade with magnetite inclusions can be found in seams. Digging tools are needed for the better materials. Field Trips may take collectors to the nearby Sidewander Mountains to find Tri-Colored Marble which ranges from greys to dark green. A four-wheel drive is advised for this trip.

Directions: Take I-15 past Victorville, past Stoddard Well road, and turn off (right) at Bell Mountain - Stoddard Well Exit. Follow above map to the tailgate and camp site. NOC signs will mark the camping area. Bring fire wood and food for a 6 p.m. potluck on Saturday.

Shophints

from 11/00 CHIPS

For those of you who have never cut a stone in a rock saw, I have a suggestion on how to keep or get your hands (arms & head) clean as well as a rock slab. Experienced Hands on a rock saw may also find this hint very useful.

All rock saws either uses some form of oil (Shell Pella or Texaco Almag) or a water based solution as a blade coolant. At the present, the two 10" saws and the 24" saw that I am using to cut slabs for grab bags use oil as a coolant.

After the slab is cut, the oil must be removed from the slab before the slab can be used for anything. Some people let slabs drip and then use kitty litter to absorb the oil. Others let a slab drip and then put the slab in a bucket filled with soap and water. Some use Simple Green or some form of liquid dishwashing soap. I have found that the cheapest dishwashing soap works just as effectively as the high priced variety. You can get inexpensive dishwashing soap at the 99c Store, Pic'N'Save or Walmart. It works, but dishwashing soap takes time to remove all of the oil. Simple Green is faster than dishwashing soap, but not by much.

Recently my wife picked up something called "Oil Eater" a cleaner and a degreaser at the store. The label said it was very fast and thorough. Ok fine, yeah yeah I have heard this before. I first tried it at a strength of 1 part "oil eater" to 100 parts of water and discovered to my amazement that a whole 5 gallon bucket of very dirty slabs was cleaned in under 12 hours. I then tried 1 part Oil Eater to 50 parts water, and found to my amazement that a 5 gallon bucket of very oily slabs was cleaned in 6 hours. A mixture of 1 to 20 will clean an oily slab in 2+ hours. The grease and oil form a fluffy white substance that can be drained from the bucket. Not bad.

Oil Eater is made by Kafko International in Illinois. Their phone number is 1-800-528-0334. The web site is www.kafkointl.com. It comes in 1-gallon containers (white with a red label) or 5 gallon pails.

You can buy it at Costco or some automotive parts stores (ex. United Automotive in Irwindale). Try Oil Eater is also biodegradable and environmentally friendly.
