Eye Safety: SAFETY FIRST

Most articles on rock hound safety invariably touch on eye safety in some form or another, whether it is protection from the sun on the way to a collecting site, protection from flying particles at a collecting site, or protection from dust, chemicals, or particles while processing the finds back in the shop.

Eye hazards include particles, mists, vapors, fumes, gases, laser light and ultraviolet light. At once you can see that not all of these hazards are com-monly encountered by most rock hounds, but some will be encountered by all rock hounds.

Safety glasses or spectacles are designed to provide impact protection from flying particles and have heavier frames than normal spectacles and impact resistant lenses, usually of polycarbonate. They can be tinted to protect the eyes from laser or ultraviolet light. As most particles enter the eyes at an angle it is recommended that they accommodate and are worn with side shields. Safety glasses with prescription corrective lenses are available, even bifocal and "multifocal". Do not use spectacles intended for protection from radiation and glare from the sun indoors where your vision may be impaired by the tinted lenses. Spectacles should be fitted to your eye and bridge size and temple length. The temples should fit comfortably over the eyes. The frame should be close to the face and supported by the bridge of the nose. Keep spectacles clean and clear of scratches. Store your spectacles in a case in a dry, clean place where they will not fall or be stepped on. Scratched or damaged spectacles interfere with vision and do not provide protection. Safety spectacles alone do not provide adequate protection for the eyes from fumes, vapors, liquids and large particles. Safety goggles provide a secure shield around the entire eye area to protect against hazards coming from many different directions and spread the force of impact over a larger area around the eye. Goggles are most effective when worn with safety spectacles and are also provided with impact resistant and tinted lenses. Goggles that are unvented or indirectly vented will provide protection from splash hazards. Goggles can be provided with fog free coatings. Face shields should be worn with safety spectacles and goggles to provide additional pro-tection of the face from sparks, splashes, splatter, and larger particles. Never wear a face shield alone. Face shields are available with protective head gear and chemical hoods. Typical rock hound usage of a face shield would include pouring hot liquids, use of acids to clean minerals or fossils, breaking rocks with hand and mechanical equipment, and dressing grinding wheels.

So whatever your pleasure while rock hounding, consider what potential hazards are present and select the appropriate face and eye protection required.

Cecil ?Zeke? Wilder

February 1911 to October 2002

On October 30, 2002, one of our Life Members, Cecil "Zeke" Wilder passed away at a convalescent hospital in Whittier. He was 91 years old. A grave-side service was held on November 6 at Rose Hills Memorial Park in Whittier. Zeke is survived by his son Don Wilder, daughter Saundra and his companion of almost 9 years, May Richardson. He was blessed with 7 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

Cecil ?Zeke? Wilder was born February 9, 1911, on the Rancho Del Saguaro which was located outside of Glendale (near Phoenix) in what was then Arizona Territory. His mother died as a complication of childbirth and his father left for work in California, leaving Zeke to be raised by his Grandparents. After bouncing around from farm-to-farm for 4 years, the family decided to move to California. They crossed the Mojave Desert at Needles in a Model-T Ford using the 2-car wide plank road in use at that time. Zeke claimed to still remember his first campout in the desert along that old rickety road and the pungent smell of mesquite smoke from their campfire that night.

The next few years saw Zeke and his Grandparents in Long Beach, Lynwood, Perris and Pomona. In 1917 he discovered the world of airplanes. He used to talk of his memories of big tri-planes, military SPADS (a type of bi-plane) and old Curtis JN4s (remember, this would be during or right after WW1. There weren't any 747s then).

Zeke started working in his teen years. During Junior High he bought a bicycle and took on a paper route delivering the Pomona Progress Bulletin. It was a 10-mile circle and he had to get up at 3:00 AM, finishing at 6:30 and finally to school by 8:00. He worked as a truck delivery man for the San Luis Obisbo Slaughterhouse in 1927. That same year Zeke entered High School, majoring in drafting, applied industrial science, aviation and machine shop.

During his freshman year, Zeke bought a 1925 Harley-Davidson, kick-starting a lasting love affair with motorcycles. He joined the Pomona Valley Motorcycle Club which was a Police-sponsored alternative to gangs which were a problem then as now. He participated in many club rides and races over a lot of years.

In 1931 Zeke joined the California National Guard and was discharged 2 years later as a Corporal. He went to Nevada and drove trucks for the Wilkerson Silver Mining Company. Always looking for excitement, he worked as the dynamiter's helper when he nothing to haul. During his time at the mine, Zeke explored every trail in the area on his "bike". Becoming homesick after 7 months, he was back in Pomona and working on the dynamite blasting crew with

the California Conservation Corp (CCC) as the ?local expert?, making fire roads around Mt. San Antonio.

Zeke first met his future wife Manctta Hill in 1932 while still in High School. He traded in his "bike" in favor of a car which he promptly wrecked. OK, so it was back to motorcycles for the next few years. On September 29, 1935, Zeke and Manetta tied the knot at a garden wedding before family members and fellow bikers from the motorcycle club. It was the last day of the L.A. County Fair and the fairgrounds could be seen from where the wedding was performed.

In 1936, Douglas Aircraft hired Zeke to design equipment for various aircraft and top secret projects. He spent the next 13 years with Douglas. He tried his hand at starting his own business selling fish but only lasted 5 months (rumor has it that Netta couldn't stand the smell). Next was 13 years working for Diamond Machine Tool Company in Los Angeles designing new machine tools. This job gave him the opportunity to travel around the country making sales and engineering calls.

On one such trip he had the adventure of his life when he was given a chance to fly a jet aircraft. He flew over 45,000 feet during the performance of acrobatic maneuvers at over 1000 MPH. He talked about that experience for the rest of his days. It was during this period that he bought his Whittier home.

In 1961, he started work for Osco Corp of Santa Monica and 2 years later formed his own company, Wilder Engineering Co. in partnership with the president of Osco Corp. This was his last (and probably best) job until he retired as a mechanical engineer.

In or about 1990, Netta passed away and Zeke was having health problems. In 1993, he employed May Richardson to be a part-time care giver and eventually a 9 year relationship blossomed. On August 16, 2002 Zeke entered the Royal Court Convalescent Hospital (Berryman West) where he died October 30.

Zeke joined the Whittier Gem and Mineral Society after the October Gem Show in 1976. He jumped right into the club operations as a Director in 1978, and then as chairman of various and sundry committees thereafter. His main interest, though, was field trips; rock collecting and camping.

In 1979 he led his first field trip to Owl Hole Mountains and in 1980 was Field Trip Chairman. (As a side note, Zeke was Field Trip Leader on the first Club field trip I went on). He was active on trips as participant or leader until the late 1980s.

Zeke also brought his mechanical engineering skills to work on various problems in the Club. He designed our Spinning Wheel used during the WGMS Gem Show and also an identical one for the North Orange County Gem Club. He designed and built the metal field trip signs which were widely used during the 1980s. He designed and helped build Pappy Harwood's 36" walk-in slab saw which Pappy used to cut his giant petrified wood slabs. He also rede-

signed the saw-horses used during the annual Show to hold our Showcases (this is the first year that they were not used). Zeke was made a Life Member of Whittier Gem and Mineral Society in 1989.

Zeke is also remembered for some of his other "interests?. Zeke loved to dance and is remembered as a fairly good dancer. His life-long love of airplanes led him into flying model airplanes, some of which he displayed at one of our Gem Shows.

Due to failing health, Zeke was not able to participate in Club activities for the last several years but he is remembered affectionately for his good humor and enthusiasm. He led an interesting and varied life and enjoyed many eclectic interests and experiences with the respect and admiration of those who knew him.
