Growth nears Petrified Forest

Subdivisions imperil park expansion plan, ranchers say

For nearly a decade, some of the state's largest ranchers have waited patiently to strike a deal with the federal government to enlarge Petrified Forest National Park and protect the area's geological and archaeological treasures.

But time appears to be running out as development pressures increase and the ongoing drought makes the cattle industry less viable.

Meanwhile, bills seeking the park's expansion by 97,000 acres, doubling its size, languish in U.S. House and Senate subcommittees with no hearing dates scheduled. And the state, which has been a latecomer in endorsing the expansion, still faces a laborious process in determining the value of State Land Department property that would be involved in the process.

Holbrook rancher Mike Fitzgerald, owner of the huge Twin Buttes Ranch, which borders the west side of the Petrified Forest, says he's had enough waiting.

"The fact of the matter is that I'm droughted out," Fitzgerald said. "This thing has to happen soon if it's going to happen. I've been waiting 10 years for it, so let's get it done."

Fitzgerald said a number of 40-acre subdivisions have sprouted adjoining his ranch. "I grew up here and have ranched all my life, and I'm simply not going to subdivide it myself," Fitzgerald said. "But I might have to sell it, and the next person would subdivide it like many of the other land owners around here."

Marion Hatch of Holbrook, co-owner of the Paulsell Ranch with his brother, Marvin, also is getting antsy. The Hatches own 30,000 acres and lease another 30,000 acres deemed for the expansion.

"We've tried **everything** in the world to move this land for the expansion," Marion Hatch said. "We could subdivide, but we're willing to ride the process out since we've put so much into this."

Marvin Hatch said he is confident that the expansion will go through Congress this year because "I can't imagine all that money being spent on probes to Mars and them not doing anything about one of the most educational places about our own Earth."

But critics of the negotiations have said that one of the main stumbling blocks is that the Hatches are

seeking about \$8 million for their land, which they say is far more than what it would be worth on the open market.

Randy Rasmussen of Albuquerque, who has been working on the expansion for years for the National Parks and Conservation Association, said another of the problems is that the federal Bureau of Land Management is in charge of appraising the land and has no funding to complete the process.

Determining the worth of mineral holdings on the land will likely take about two years, Rasmussen said.

The most prized area of the proposed expansion is along the Chinle Formation, which stretches in a band across north-eastern Arizona. Most of the petrified wood is in a narrow strip that begins seven miles east of the park and ends three miles southwest of the Petrified Forest. The area also has been rich in dinosaur finds in recent years.

Petrified wood can be removed legally from private land. But the illegal activities of archaeological looters in the area has been an ongoing problem. In 2001, about 400 Indian burial sites were dug near the eastern boundary of the park.

In a letter last month to Rep. George Radanovich, R-Calif., chairman of the House subcommittee on national parks, recreation and public lands, Gov. Janet Napolitano wrote that the Petrified Forest expansion needs to happen soon.

The national park and surrounding areas are "the best record of early Triassic terrestrial ecosystems in the world" and some of the land in the expansion area has even better resources than those found in the park, Napolitano wrote.

The administration of former Gov. Jane Hull had opposed the expansion because of the large amount of state land sought. The Arizona Game and Fish Department also has had concerns about the amount of land that would be removed from the state's hunting domain.

Rasmussen said that one hopeful development is that three of the four private land owners have said that they are interested in trading their land for other BLM land in northeastern Arizona. Those lands could then be swapped to the Park Service once they are in the public domain at no cost to the federal treasury.

That would be just fine for the NZ Corp., which owns land on the southeast side of Petrified Forest, said Scott Higginson of Phoenix, an NZ spokesman.

"We're willing to do a deal of equal value from the land that the BLM identifies for disposal," Higginson said. "We are anxious to get the land into its proper hands."
