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# NOC General Meeting Minutes - Sep. 11, 2005

Our speaker was introduced, Joe Girtner, shared a fascinating program on Pre-Historical Indian Cog Artifacts. Slides were shown and he also brought several samples of his own Cog collection along with samples of beads and jewelry made by local Indians.

As suggested by Loretta tonight's raffle money will go into the Red Cross collection box – voted on and approved.

Show Report: Because Don Warthen was in Paradise this month Nancy Bird reported on the show this year. Don Eschbach handed out a Show Report written by Don Warthen to all members. It was announced that Don Warthen would take on the Show Chairmanship for 2006.

Izzie Burns reported on the Future Rockhounds of America program to club member asking for their vote to set up a group in La Habra. Future Rockhounds would be open to all La Habra and surrounding area youth from 8-18 years. The purpose of the club is to assist local youth and to interest adults in the area to join NOC. Club members were invited to ask questions and then to vote on the establishment of a group. Concerns consisted of liability to NOC and where we would acquire young members. 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## Minutes of Board Meeting Wednesday, 9/7/05

Attendees included Nancy Bird, Don and Ophelia Warthen, Bill and Isabelle Burns, Loretta Ogden, and Pat Felix.

The first item for discussion was which board positions would be open for new occupants as of 1/1/06. Loretta accepted the position of Chairman of the Nominating Committee. It was determined that we will need two new directors, a Second Vice President (Membership Responsibility), and a Secretary. A new Librarian also must be appointed, as Pat Felix will be moving out of town next year.

Don Warthen presented the Treasurer's report and gave it to Nancy. He said that through our donation awards ticket money, we were able to give the Youth Club of LaHabra a check for \$1200. These young people were very helpful at our June show, though they were completely surprised at being given the money, and were very grateful.

The September 13<sup>th</sup> meeting's program will be a talk and slide show by Joe Girtner, an instructor of Art at Cerritos College, on some prehistoric artifacts of Orange County, particularly Bolsa Chica, called "Cogs". These are a subject of much interest and conjecture among historians because their purpose is not known. Mr. Girtner will bring examples from his own large collection.

Nancy is planning to bring a collection box to the meeting for victims of Hurricane Katrina. The money will be divided among three verified charitable organizations: The Red Cross, The Salvation Army, and habitat for Humanity.

We will wait for next Tuesday's meeting to hear from Don Eschbach about field trip plans.

The club workshop is set up and ready to go at Don and Loretta's house. The Grand Opening will be on Tuesday, October 18<sup>th</sup>, at 7 p.m., and every Tuesday night thereafter except for meeting nights. It was agreed that the system formerly in place at Walt Messemer's, in which participants purchase a card good for 12 uses for \$25, then have it punched each time, was convenient, so it will be used again. Loretta will bring directions to their house to the September 13<sup>th</sup> meeting.

On 9/27, there will be a meeting at 7 p.m. in the Avocado Room for those members interested in planning next year's show. Don Warthen said work must begin now if we want to be accomplish everything in time, and also the City wants to publicize it in their paper, so want us to provide information. The date of next year's show is 6/3-6/4/06. Possible themes were discussed, including a showcase of member's best work for the main case. Some possible attractions might be offering adult classes during show hours and a scavenger hunt with metal detectors outdoors. It was mentioned that Steve with the Delvers Club is experienced with metal detectors, and also that contacting a local store may provide us with at least a representative, if not a prize. Magellan's, the maker of GPS systems, was recommended. Everyone felt the jewelry making for kids was big hit last year, and we should expand on that next year by finding more members to help with it. We will need to find display cases this year or make them. Don Warthen has a blueprint for making them, which he will find and put in a later bulletin.

A couple weeks ago, some of our members who would like to begin a youth division of our club met (Bill and Izzy, Don and Ophelia, Janis Logsdon). They wrote up some basic ideas on how it could be organized and will bring them to the next meeting.

Izzy brought a notice from the AFMS regarding the sale of cartons (only) of three books of great interest to rockhounds, offered at a great price reduction to gem and mineral clubs only. The orders must be submitted by September 25<sup>th</sup>, so it was decided to ask for club members' vote at the next

meeting before the money was spent. Izzy will bring the details to the meeting.

There is a new type of insurance being offered to clubs that protects the officers and directors of the club, should the club be sued. The cost is \$250/year. The Board recommends purchasing it, though this type of issue must be voted on by the membership, so that will be done at the September meeting.

The AFMS show next year will be held in Nashville, TN.

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## Winter Holiday Safety

**Beware of holiday lighting.** Take care when burning candles. Be sure they are kept away from decorations or other combustible materials. Don't leave children unattended in a room with lit candles, and always keep candles, as well as matches and lighters, out of the reach of children. Never display lighted candles in windows or near exits. Decorate only with flame-retardant or noncombustible materials. Avoid using candles during parties. If guests will be smoking, provide them with large, deep ashtrays and check them frequently. After the party, check inside and under upholstery and in trash cans for cigarette butts that may be smoldering.

**If using electrical lights,** don't overload a circuit.

**Keep Christmas trees fresh.** Choose a fresh Christmas tree and secure it in a sturdy stand. Place the tree away from heat sources and exits, and water it daily. If you purchase an artificial tree, be sure it is labeled as fire-retardant. If you plan to hang stockings on your fireplace, do not use the fireplace for fires.

**Designate a driver.** When attending a party, always designate a non-drinking driver. If you are the host of a holiday gathering, be sure there are non-alcoholic beverages available for guests who are driving. Buckle up. During the holiday months, people travel more than ever. Wearing a seat belt is the easiest and best way to prevent injury in a motor vehicle collision. Ensure that all passengers are also wearing safety belts. Enroll in a first aid and CPR course. Although these tips can help prevent an emergency, it is also important to be prepared should an emergency situation arise.

To enroll in a first aid or CPR course, contact your local Red Cross.

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## Having Fun Juniors Activities

At this year's annual CFMS show and convention, I had good conversations with members of various societies on the topic of involving kids. The most common lament was that many clubs are composed primarily of older members and that kids are few-and-far-between. Thus, while they wish they could get a juniors program up-and-running, there are no kids within the current ranks of the club membership.

We talked about possible ways to play the Pied Piper and draw kids in. One way is through the annual show. If your club has an annual show, be sure to have a visible kids activities area and stock it with flyers describing your club and welcoming families with kids to join. And have a sign-up sheet to collect phone numbers for follow-up.

During my conversations, we also talked about engaging in outreach and checking on possibilities of forging connections with local kids programs already in the community, such as the Boy and Girl Scouts, 4H, YMCA, etc. Many kids in such programs enjoy earning the pins and badges and other awards such programs offer. You can introduce the new AFMS Future Rockhounds of America Badge program to

show how you can help kids earn "neat stuff" while enjoying the outdoors, building collections, and learning the craft of jewelry-making, either within the context of monthly meetings and planned group events or on their own.

But the single most important thing, by far, is having a single dedicated individual within your club appointed as the Juniors Activities Coordinator. My own club in Ventura is one of those where kids are presently few-and-far-between, and our success drawing in and maintaining a kids program has waxed and waned. The boom times are when we have an appointed coordinator who takes the job seriously and maps out the entire year in advance with planned activities for each month. Thus, the activities can be publicized well in advance so that kids and their parents can look ahead and enter activities into their schedule. One member, Emma Mayer, was spectacular at this, but we were unable to enlist a replacement for her at the conclusion of her term, and the program has waned.

Thus, in my experience, it comes down to a single individual. The kids are out there. Who's the Pied Piper in your club to draw them in and keep them in with activities they find meaningful and enjoyable? Cultivate that individual, encourage that individual, and—as a whole club—support that individual and make long-term plans for successors to continue the program once it's begun. Yes, it takes a single individual, but it takes a whole club to bring the necessary commitment to ensure a program's long-term success. Here's to committing to having fun!



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## Museum Corner

### The San Diego Natural History Museum

The San Diego Natural History Museum is a disappointment to me. In the past, there was a hall of minerals that consisted, for a large part of the Josie Scripps collection and displays of mineral characteristics and the many gemstones found in San Diego County and how they are mined. There was also a fine hall of paleontology.

Two to three years ago they added a new wing to the building where all of the displays are and all of the old halls became offices and classrooms for school children. Today the minerals of San Diego County are displayed in one four-foot square case. The paleontology displays are scattered around with no continuity..

Oh! The CFMS Nephrite Jade boulder is still on display, but the credit label for the CFMS has been removed.

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### Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center

The Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center has a fine museum that is dedicated to earth science subjects. They recently acquired a collection of dinosaur eggs from Hunan Province in China that is reputed to be the largest collection of Chimneys dinosaur eggs in the United States. I counted twenty-three clusters and single specimens on display at the museum. Most all have been cat scanned and many show that they contain embryos. They also have a complete skeleton of a Craptosaurus dinosaur on display.

In addition to the above, they also have twelve displays of fossil animals, six displays of fossil plants, twelve displays of rocks and minerals, three displays of lapidary arts and seven displays of Native American crafts.

In addition to the above, there is an animated display of the geological history of the Jurupa Mountains, a display of antique equipment and a display on loan from NASA on meteorites. Be sure to see the CFMS collection of petrified wood on display.

Eighteen of the displays have very appropriate background paintings showing the environments of the displayed specimens. These paintings add tremendously to the effectiveness of the exhibits. There is another building that has additional displays and a store where books, and many rocks, minerals and fossil specimens can be purchased.

There are many outreach programs at the Center, mostly aimed at young people. The oldest is collecting rocks at the dinosaurs (life-size models). Summer School and Boy and Girl Scout badge programs are also offered. A lapidary class for adults will open in the near future. There is also a plant nursery where botanical specimens can be purchased.

The Center is open from Tuesday through Saturday form 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM except for holidays.

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## Rhyolites

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via *The Petrified Log Jan./2005*

Rhyolites are the fine-grained, light colored igneous rocks with a composition similar to granite. Crystals of each mineral may be very small, and may not even be discernible. Some are called “wonderstone”.

In Nevada at Washington Mountain, near Fallon, you can collect cabochon quality rock. In New Mexico at Truth Or Consequences, the rhyolite, called “candy rock”, is brightly banded in tints and shades of yellow, red, orange, rose, and lavender. The material is hard, compact and takes a mirror polish. At Eagle Peak, southwest of Truth Or Consequences, red, yellow, cream, buff, and white occur in intricately banded and swirled rocks. In Utah, at Yuba Lake, birdseye is found. In California, you may find banded and brecciated rhyolites in Kern County, and orbicular rhyolites, with two-toned eyes, in the Ord Mountains.
