Wonders of a Crystal

A crystal is one of the strangest objects in the universe. It is not alive, yet it grows. A crystal attracts the same kind of materials of which it is composed, arranges them with great accuracy in geometrical forms, cements the parts together, and holds them.

Place a crystal in a liquid or vapor composed of the same ingredients as the crystal, and the process of accumulation immediately begins. If a crystal was broken into two parts and placed in a bath of liquefied crystal, the broken surface will be repaired and each part will grow into another crystal, providing the other conditions favorable for crystal growth are present.



Safety

Licking rocks can be dangerous, and even FATAL!! Always use water from a squirt gun or bottle to wet stones. At least one death has been attributed to a fungus contracted from licking a rock specimen.

Materials containing Arsenic, Mercury, Selenium, some of the Boron and even Phosphate minerals can be deadly.

Sawing Geodes

When sawing Geodes, look for the largest dome on the specimen. This dome was in an upright position while it was formed. Saw through the largest dome and it is likely you will get the best picture.

If the specimen is elongated or egg-shaped, saw lengthwise to obtain the best exposure. While there is no certain means to determine the interior of an agate nodule or geode, these ideas are likely to be beneficial.

Solder

via *The Burro Express* 3/97, *Rock-A-Teer* 8/05, and *Del-Air Bulletin* 1/08

If you get too much solder on a spot when making jewelry, trying to file it off takes too much time.

To get rid of the excess without filing:

1. Take a narrow strip of silver 1/8 x 2 inch.
2. Cut a slit in one end.
3. Heat the piece with the excess solder, touch the strip with the to the excess.

The extra solder will flow up the cut.

Polishing Jasper

Jasper is more troublesome to polish than agate because many varieties are "earthy" and porous and others contain hermatite, which in itself is difficult to polish.

If you are on a field trip, a good way to test for jasper is to wet it. If it absorbs the water and dries rapidly, throw it away. It will not polish.

If it stays wet and does not dry right away, it contains a high amount of chalcedony and will take a good polish.

Most jaspers polish well on leather with lime, but good results can be obtained with titanium oxide or either leather or felt.

Always remember that a good fine sanding job is the secret of good polishing.

Deep Earth Rocks San Andreas Fault

About 23 miles north of Paso Robles, scientists drilled 2.5 miles down into the San Andreas Fault and removed 4 inch core samples which they hope will answer the question why this section of the fault moves so gently, instead of rupturing violently.

Is it the serpentine? Is it serpentine decaying into talc? Further study may tell.

Scientists will next place seismometers and tiltmeters into the borehole directly above the spot that ruptures, to detect earthquakes from the place where earthquake energy accumulates.

One-day SDMG Field Trip

"The rain broke on Saturday morning, February 23rd, and we had a great day for a field trip. Forty-seven rockhounds signed in, including several field trip leaders from other southern California clubs, plus members of the Whittier, NOC, Fallbrook, El Cajon, San Diego and other clubs. SDMG Field Trip Leader

Jim Mellos gave an introductory talk, then everyone broke into two groups. Asst. SDMG Field Trip Leader Dave Rosendahl lead one group right up to the Blue Lady Mine, to look for crystals. Jim Mellos lead another group on an hour-long general hike through the collecting area.

Amanda Hiner, a 14 year old first-time field tripper, found a facet-grade piece of deep blue tourmaline big enough to cut a 1 ct. stone.

A San Diego couple found a 2.5" by 1" smoky quartz crystal under a bush, and a 3/4" long blue tourmaline pencil, among other things.

John Greaves and his daughter Katie found a 10" diameter flat cluster of clear quartz crystals, and a tourminated black tourmaline.

Surface collecting was phenomenal. Everyone got some crystals. The rains of previous days had eroded out and exposed much new material -- everything was still wet! A flock of turkeys was sighted on the way out."

The field trip was attended by NOC members Nancy Bird, Jay Valle, and Don Ogden.

NOC General Meeting Minutes La Habra Community Center February 12, 2008

Call to Order: President Don Eschbach called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM followed by the flag salute.

Membership: The meeting was attended by 25 members & 5 guests.

Program: Two related videos from the CFMS video library: Great Floods of the Northwest & Ginkgo Petrified Forest of Oregon.

Acknowledgements:

1. Don Eschbach had the participants of the February 7 wire wrapping class stand and show their wire wrap projects.
2. Bill & Izzy taught a class in rocks to local Girl Scout Troop #74. They explained hardness and other basic characteristics of minerals and rocks.

December Minutes: Don Eschbach asked if there were any changes to the January Minutes - there were none. They will stand as read.

Treasurers Report: Don Warthen gave the Treasurers Report. There were no corrections so they will stand as read.

■ Don W. also informed us that we had been the victims of Bank Fraud, the amount of \$69.20. Someone had accessed our checking account and was using it for on-line purchases. After being told of the unauthorized charges, Bank of America and the on-line finance company (ElectraCash) blocked further payments from this account. NOC has filed criminal charges with the City of La Habra Police Dept. & the Bank of America Fraud Division and they are investigating. Our stolen money will be refunded after the investigation is complete.

■ Don W. distributed copies of the proposed budget for 2008 and discussed each line item. Dave Swanston made a motion to accept the proposed budget as read and Bill Burns seconded the motion. There was no further discussion and the vote was unanimous to accept the budget.

Field Trips: Jay Valle informed the membership that the Club field trip will be to Wiley Wells the upcoming weekend of February 16-18 (we are joined by the PLS & Whittier Clubs.) Maps to the camp are in the NOC bulletin and you should let Jay know if you plan to come. The Quartzsite trip at the end of January was a lot of fun but only 1 NOC participants came out that I am aware of. Izzy told us that the Indio Date Festival was also going on during the field trip weekend. Saturday, February 23, the San Diego Club is going on a day trip to the Blue Lady Tourmaline Mine. Contact me after the meeting if you want information on where to meet, etc. A reminder about the Tri-Federation field trip to Texas Springs coming up in May 21 thru 26. If you want to go on this trip, start making plans now - we need to inform the field trip leaders how many of us are going by the end of April. Don Eschbach added that we are probably going to hold a field trip meeting and establish some daytrips per NOC member feedback to supplement the regular scheduled trips.

Federation Report: Loretta Ogden reminded us of the June CFMS Show in Ventura on June 27 to 29. There is camping at the fairgrounds and lots of hotels in the area. She also mentioned that Amtrak goes right to the fairgrounds. She asked that members participate by putting in a showcase and suggested that NOC enter a Club Case with the theme of "What We Teach." Don Eschbach suggested that the members of the wire wrapping class should display a case of their creations. Nancy Bird pointed out that this year CFMS members can put in cases for "evaluation" as well as competition so that the judges can tell you how to do your case better. There is an Editor's Breakfast on Saturday morning and the Awards dinner id held on Saturday night. Note: Don Ogden's CFMS Internet Committee is sponsoring the "Cracker Barrel" get together on Friday at the show. Loretta asked members to come out and enjoy the "meet-the-CFMS-leaders" event with us.

Librarian Report: No report.

Programs: Nancy Bird informed us that next month's program will feature a guest speaker & slide show about the Himalaya Tourmaline Mine which was recently featured on an episode of the Travel Channel's program, "Cash & Treasures."

Refreshments: The March Meeting snacks we will be provided by Don & Ofelia Warthen. Thanks go to Dave & Fran Swanston for the wonderful spread for tonight's meeting.

Show Report: Don Warthen told us that we have all of our dealers signed up now, including a new dealer from Sedona, Arizona who specializes in copper. Wendy has been taking over many of the Children's programs and events. The big new thing, though, is the Friday VIP Mixer which NOC will be hosting for members of the La Habra Chamber of Commerce and City Council. We will also invite members of the La Mirada and Brea Chambers to join us at this event as well. It will be held in the main room and our dealers can sell to the guests as they circulate around the room. NOC members will be asked to provide finger food and we will need a lot of help staging the event. The 3D Art people will be bringing the desserts.

Walt Wright will have part of his collection of petrified wood on display across the hall from the main room. We will receive the room at about 8 AM on Friday morning and we need to be done by 5 PM. The Seniors will be going down to the Hometown Buffet while we do our setup (NOC and the City of La Habra split the bill.) The dealers must be set up in time to open between 5:00 & 8:00 PM to sell to the VIP guests. NOC will also be providing other food for the mixer - we have a budget for the event of \$500. We want to sell a lot of Raffle Tickets during the 3 hour period.

We need NOC setup people in early so we can get everything prepared for the dealers who will start showing up about noon. City people will start setting up tables at 8 AM and we need to be at the storage building about 8 AM to start loading the truck (we will begin unloading at the Community Center about 10 AM.) A regular timetable will be published before Show time.

■ Nancy Bird asked that the Board budget more money for speakers. The Board agreed that Nancy finds out that she needs more money for speakers, she should request the Board for approval.

New Business:

Nancy Bird asked the members present if they enjoyed the video program. The response was positive. She stated that we will probably show another video some time in the Fall when our Program Funds are running short.

Don Eschbach noted that one of our guests found us by visiting our NOC web site. He thanked Don Ogden for his continued fine work on the web page.

Nancy Bird reminded everyone that the Monrovia Gem Show was the weekend of March 1-2 at the LA County Arboretum. There is also the Pasadena & Palomar Shows on March 8-9.

Jon warmly greeted everyone and showed those who had not collected petrified whalebone before sample of what we were looking for.
