Safety

*via Rock Rattler 10/96, Rock Rollers 8/07, and
Del-Air Bulletin 1/08*

Licking rocks can be dangerous, and even FATAL!! Always use water from a squirt gun or bottle to wet stones. At least one death has been attributed to a fungus contracted from licking a rock specimen.

Materials containing Arsenic, Mercury, Selenium, some of the Boron and even Phosphate minerals can be deadly.

Stablizing Turquoise

*via The Pegmatite4/08, from Dops and
Digs 01/95 via The Rock Collector 11/07*

To stabilize chrysocolla or turquoise, use both tubes of water-clear epoxy and one pint of acetone, and be sure it is well mixed. Use a container that you can seal up, like a big glass jar or a three-pound coffee-can. Be sure that your rock is clean and dry.

Soak in this solution for several weeks, depending on the size of the rock. Soak a fist-size piece three weeks. Take out of solution wearing rubber or surgical gloves. Let dry for about 10 days, depending on the size. Cut, grind, and polish as you do any turquoise.

Dear Sir:

I am writing to thank you for bouncing my check with which I endeavored to pay my plumber last month.

By my calculations, three nanoseconds must have elapsed between his presenting the check and the arrival in my account of the funds needed to honor it.

medical history must be countersigned by a Notary Public, and the mandatory details of his/her financial situation (income, debts, assets and liabilities) must be accompanied by documented proof. In due course, at MY convenience, **I will** issue your **employee** with a **PIN** number which he/she must quote in dealings with me.

I regret that it cannot be shorter than 28 digits but, again, **I** have modeled it on the number of button presses required of me to access my account balance on your phone bank service. As they say, imitation is the sincerest form of flattery.

Let me level the playing field even further.

When you call me, press buttons as follows:
IMMEDIATELY AFTER DIALING, PRESS THE STAR (*) BUTTON FOR ENGLISH

- #1. To make an appointment to see me
- #2. To query a missing payment.
- #3. To transfer the call to my living room in case I am there.
- #4. To transfer the call to my bedroom in case I am sleeping
- #5. To transfer the call to my toilet in case I am attending to nature.
- #6. To transfer the call to my mobile phone if I am not at home
- #7. To leave a message on my computer, a password to access my computer is required. Password will be communicated to you at a later date to that Authorized Contact mentioned earlier.
- #8. To return to the main menu and to listen to options 1 through 7.
- #9. To make a general complaint or inquiry. The contact will then be put on hold, pending the attention of my automated answering service.
- #10. This is a second reminder to press* for English. While this may, on occasion, involve a lengthy wait, uplifting music will play for the duration of the call.

Regrettably, but again following your example, I must also levy an establishment fee to cover the setting up of this new arrangement. May I wish you a happy, if ever so slightly less prosperous New Year?

NOC History

THE PRESENT:

The North Orange County Gem & Mineral Society (NOC) is dedicated to the advancement of the earth sciences, by stimulating interest and encouraging the study of the geological and mineral science and in lapidary arts.

NOC is a member of the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies (CFMS) and the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies (AFMS). NOC received the AFMS All American Club Award from 1985 through 1992.

NOC meets every second Tuesday evening at 7:00 p.m. in the La Habra Community Center, except for the months of July and August and currently has 80 members. Club activities include classes and workshops in beading, cabochon cutting and polishing, carving, faceting, geology, lapidary, and silver smithing. Monthly field trips are taken to various geological and archaeological sites, in order to obtain specimens for the club's workshops. Visitors are always welcomed and children are especially encouraged to attend all of NOC events and meetings.

An annual show with fifteen dealers is held at the La Habra Community Center in June each year. Members demonstrate gold panning, wire wrapping, cabochon finishing, faceting, and a children's section that allows them to be exposed to earth sciences. The Youth Committee of La Habra, CA provide food, in conjunction with the Lion's Club. Educational classes are provided to La Habra schools and day centers as a part of NOC's services. The show's theme is Jubilee of Gems. This year's highlight exhibit will be Petrified Wood from the personal, extensive collection of Walt Wright, a national petrified expert, who will be on site to lecture and answer questions.

Plans are in process to build and maintain a geological and mineralogy museum, workshop, and classrooms, so as to further promote education into these sciences. The business plan is being written and building sites are under consideration.

NOC HISTORY:

NOC was formed by members of the Whittier Mineralogy Club in 1981, under Section 501(c)3 of the IRS Code, establishing it as a non-profit charitable organization. Members of the Whittier Mineralogy club decided that another club located in the La Habra area was needed.

The first two meetings were held at Leroy Grosenheider's home and Bill Burns gave a presentation on Opals at the first meeting. Meetings were then held at Mercury Savings from 1981 to 1991. Additional meeting sites were: the Senior Center Assembly Room (behind the Library, 209 South Orange, La Habra, CA in the years 1992 to 1997 and in The Veteran's Hall, La Habra, CA from 1997 to 2000. Meetings were then held in the La Habra Community Center, 101 W. La Habra Blvd., La Habra, CA from 2000 to the present.

INTERESTING FACTS FROM NOC PAST:

Izzie and Bill Burns joined the NOC Club in 1984. They were instrumental in the formation and operation of both CFMS Outings - Zzyzx Workshop, held near Baker, CA in March each year, and Camp Paradise campout near Marysville, CA held in September each year. These outings are one week camping outings and members spend each week performing lapidary operations

of their choice. Members are able to specialize in their lapidary skills at these events.

The 1988 CFMS/AFMS Show was extremely successful and profitable by NOC and it was held at the Orange County Fair Grounds, Costa Mesa, CA. Workshops included faceting, carving, and wire wrapping. Six buildings were rented and 1,000 tables were utilized by NOC personnel. The CFMS/AFMS Show was again sponsored at Riverside, CA by NOC and four other mineralogy clubs in August 6 - 11, 1996. Another successful show!

Charles O'Neill manufactured the big case carrier for NOC in 1991. The big case was made and sold by a Long Beach club member and first utilized at the 1996 Riverside Show.

Cabochon classes were held at Walt Messemer's home in the years from 1988 to 2003. Donald and Loretta Ogden held cabochon workshop classes at their home in 2007 and 2008.

Charter Member Joan Greenlees Abrahamson has published numerous poems and books, related to mineralogy over the time period of her NOC membership.

Virginia Page won the Bulletin Editor's Hall of Fame Award in 1997. Virginia was editor of the NOC Monthly Bulletins for numerous years and her awards for the excellence of the monthly bulletins.

The Rockwell International, Autoneutics Division, Mineralogy Club closed and many of its members merged with NOC in 2003. Then in 2006, the Hacienda Heights Mineralogy Club members merged with NOC.

For the first 20 years or so, one annual field trip consisted of an Easter Sunday Ceremony. Alternating years, male and female members would place a cross upon a hill at the outing site. Services would be held at dawn and members would observe the dawning of the sun. A potluck breakfast would then be held.

Emerald is Gemstone of the Month for May

The name emerald derives from the Greek “Smaragdus, which in turn came perhaps from the Persian. It means “green stone” and, in ancient times, referred not only to emeralds, but also probably to most green stones.

Emerald, together with aquamarine and beryl, belongs to the beryl group, being the most precious of the group. Its green is incomparable, and is therefore called “emerald green”. The pigment is chrome, sometimes vanadium. The color is very stable against light and heat.

Only the finest qualities are transparent. Often the emerald is clouded by inclusions (liquid or

gas bubbles, healing cracks and foreign crystals). These are not necessarily classified as fault, but are evidence as to the genuineness of the stone as compared with synthetic and other imitations. The expert refers to these inclusions as a “jardin” (garden).

The physical properties, especially the specific gravity and double refraction as well as pleochroism, vary according to source area. All emeralds are brittle and combined with internal stresses, sensitive to pressure; care must be taken in heating them. They are resistant to chemicals with the exception of fluororic acid.

Emeralds are formed by rising magma and metamorphism. Deposits are therefore found mainly in or near pegmatite veins. Mining is nearly exclusively from host rock, where the emerald has grown into small veins or on walls of cavities. Alluvial mining would hardly be possible as the specific gravity is near that of quartz.

The most important deposits are in Colombia, especially the Muzo and Chivor Mines near Bogota. The state of Columbia tries to impose a control over the sale of emeralds, but the larger part of the production reaches the trade illegally. The Chibcha Indians of Colombia mined emeralds and through trade with Peru and the Aztecs of Mexico, the Spainards were determined to find their source. They found the Chivor mine in 1537 and send most of emeralds back to the Spanish court.

There are many well-known large emeralds, as famous as diamonds and rubies. Some beautiful specimens of several carats are kept by the British Museum of Natural History in London, by the American Museum of Natural History in New York, Russia and in the Persian crown Jewels. In the Viennese treasury is a jug, 4¾ in/12cm high and weighting 2205 ct, cut from a single emerald crystal.

Emerald has a Mohs hardness of 7 ½-8, specific gravity 2.67-2.78, Cleavage is None, Fracture is small conchoidal, uneven and brittle
